Profile of the Tyagbir Hem Baruah College

Brief introduction of the College

Tyagbir Hem Baruah College came into existence in the realm of higher education in Jamugurihat on July 16, 1963 as a result of noble endeavors of a few torch bearers with enormous support from hundreds of enlightened minds from the locality in their own capacity, guided by the ideals of optimism, courage and sacrifice. At the time of inception, the college was named as "Jamuguri College" which later on renamed after the famous freedom fighter Tyagbir Hem Baruah College as per decision of the Executive Committee of the college on February 8, 1965. The college has presently a sprawling campus of about 30 acres of land with natural wetlands, converted to fish farms by the Alumni Association of the college. There is a Botanicalgarden with fruit bearing tree and quite a large number of medicinal plants and valuable timber woods. The Tea Garden of the college under "Seuj Udyug" scheme, the first of its kind in any college in the entire Brahmaputra Valley started with the aim of generating resources for making the college self-reliant to some extent. The college received its deficit grants-in-aid of the University Grant Commission (UGC) in 1974. With major development like introduction of science stream in 1989, the college completed its glorious journey of 50 years in 2013.

The college, which was once stared with seven department *viz.*, English, Assamese, Economics, Education, History and Political Science at intermediate and undergraduate level, are now offering courses to about 2000 students in Arts and Science. Integrated Teacher Education Programme is going to be lunched from the year 2023-2024 with grant of recognition from NCTE. The college has undergone assessment by National Assessment and Accreditation Council (NAAC) three times first in 2004 and later in 2011 and 2020. On the first assessment the college was accredited with grade C+ while in the next two assessments the college was awarded Grade-B. Besides imparting knowledge to the students, the college is contributing a bit towards social and economic upliftment of the community.

The college has a number of societies, like Economic Planning Forum, Women Cell, Geographical Society, Education Society, Political Science Forum, Biological Society, TRIDHARA (a literary society of the Department of Nepali, English, and Assamese of the college) etc. to conduct different activities of academic and social importance. Holding of seminars/ symposium/ training programs/ workshops on areas of greater academic and social importance is a regular exercise of almost all the departments of the college aiming at benefiting the college fraternity and the local community. The works undertaken by NSS cell, NCC and the Women Cell, UBA cell of the college are working in this regard. The Career Guidance & Counseling Cell (CGCC) extends all moral support and career guidance to all students by regularly organizing various talks on emerging career options in the present context.

Methodology of Audit

The inputs received from the departments as per the proforma (Annexure-1) have been validated from the supporting documents, interaction with the Head of the Department, and visits to the departments.

Observations

CurricularAspects

Tyagbir Hem Baruah College, Jamugurihat is affiliated with Gauhati University. The College follows the curriculum developed by Gauhati University. For effective delivery of curriculum, the departments are maintaining lessonplans and course progress records. Departments follow the academic calendar of Gauhati University and the college has its own in alignment with Gauhati University's calendar. However, no any Add-on/ Certificate Programmes are conducted by any departments during the assessment period.

• Teaching learningaspects

Assessment of learning levels to identify slow and advanced learners is carried out through sessional examination, seminars, and assignments. Though the College follows students' centric learning method for effective curriculum delivery, however, a detailed unit-wise plan for experiential and participative learning needs to be maintained for enhancing the learning experiences of the students. The College maintains a mentoring system. But documentation of the mentoring system is not adequate. All the conduct internal examinations departments the as per requirement of the affiliating University. The College different modes for continuous incorporate more evaluation.

Program Outcomes, Program Specific Outcomes, and Course Outcomes are described in the syllabus. Evaluation of the attainment of the learning outcomes to be evaluated properly.

• Research, Innovation, and Extension

The college has recently started various research activities. However, the overall research culture in the College needs to be strengthened. Several departments are conducting very effective extension activities. The involvement of the students in those activities should be encouraged.

• Infrastructure

The College has adequate infrastructure facilities for all academic and other extracurricular activities. The indoor and outdoor play area is adequate. The library and IT facilities need to be improved including increased internet bandwidth.

Student Support and Progression

Several Departments conduct capacity-building and skill enhancement activities for the students. The placement of the students and progression to higher education is encouraging. Students need more encouragement for participation in extracurricular activities.

• Professional Development Activities

A few teachers have participated in FDP. But more teachers need to be participated in FDPs.

SWOT Analysis

Strength of the Institution

- 1. The teaching community of the college demonstrates remarkable zeal and proficiency in transaction of curriculum and updating of their knowledge, and engagement in research activities. The college has a sizeable number of faculty members possessing Ph.D. degrees.
- 2. There is constant rise in number of research publication by the faculty members.
- 3. The college also runs parallel courses under open universities namely K. K. Handiqui State Open University, Institute of Distance and Open Learning, Gauhati University.
- 4. The library of the college is well equipped with a rich and constantly growing collection of books and journals. The computerization of the library has been accomplished and it is an active member of INFLIBNET.
- 5. There has been continuous effort at converting traditional lecture halls to smart class rooms. Efforts are on to promote the laboratory facilities in different departments further.
- 6. A stadium has been built in the college campus with the fund of Rs. 36 lac from UGC. Additionally the college offers facilities of basket ball, volley ball and badminton courts in the college premises.
- 7. The NCC unit of the college has been offering training to large number of students for years and it has greatly benefitted those opting for recruitment in the armed forces.
- 8. The extension activities of the college are being gradually stepped up with involvement of more students and teachers.
- 9. The college frequently hosts different important vents like youth festival, national level seminars and workshops of academic and cultural importance which helps in growth of an environment conducive to research and academic development.
- 10. The college organizes football and volley ball workshops, and programmes of self defense for the budding and aspiring students.

11. The college has about 20 hectare of land resource which has been used for tea, betel nut and lemon plantation besides construction of buildings. The college has a number of natural ponds converted to fish farms.

Weakness of the Institute

- 1. Fund crunch, needless to say, is the major problem that hinders and delays the good things to happen on the ground.
- 2. Though the college has enough space for different activities, yet it is without an indoor stadium. Besides, the college requires a new girls' hostel for the girls coming from the remote areas.
- 3. The college needs more computers proportionate to the rising number of students.
- 4. The college needs better system of waste management.
- 5. Toilet system to be updated further.

Opportunities

- 1. The college has a great pool of sports talent among the students from SC and ST communities like the Bodo, Mising and Tea tribes. Proper training, workshops and competitions can certainly boost their talents to grow.
- 2. By means of proper planning and use of technology, land resources of the college can be exploited for income generation to make the college self-reliant.
- 3. The college can go for collaborative activities with different social groups from the nearby villages with assistance from the Panchayat offices and NGOs like Kanyaka.
- 4. Introduction of new courses like M.L.T., diploma in Entrepreneurship etc. if carried out properly, can open new opportunities for self-employment and private enterprise.

- 5. Other self-financing courses can be introduced to attract students of the locality and beyond the state. In this regard initiatives may be taken for introduction of courses like integrated B.A./B.Sc. programmes.
- 6. The authority can maximize the use of existing infrastructure for more student oriented activities with proper planning and stimulation.
- 7. The college is bountifully endowed with natural resources which can be utilized for its further growth.
- 8. There is scope for engaging the students in different initiatives taken by the college like tea plantation, manufacturing of green tea, bee keeping and bottling etc. for remuneration.

Challenges

- 1. Making arrangements every year for accommodating rising number of students enrolled for different courses in the college is a real challenge before the authority. Every year the authority has to appoint more teachers on contract, increase infrastructural facilities and other support. The most challenging task is to maintain the quality of teaching-learning experiences.
- 2. The teacher-student ratio is a real menace that constantly keeps the authority under pressure. In view of the socio-economic changes the college has to be constantly in search of new income generating sources.
- 3. More than 90 percent of the students belong to the BPL category which is a big challenge to this institution for maintaining motivation and reducing the dropout rate.
 - Such challenges jeopardize smooth functioning and development of the college, still the authority works with the conviction that challenge of any stature can be overcome with a visionary leadership and missionary zeal.

Recommendations

- Few bigger classrooms need to be created with ICT facilities to conduct common classes which will be required from the next academic year for implementation of FYUGP.
- The College should prepare an Institutional Development Plan as desired in the NEP-2020.
- The college needs to evolve a structured methodology for identifying the slow learners and
- Remedial measures for their improvement.
- As under NEP-2020, it is desirable for a college to be multidisciplinary in nature, attempts should be made to create regular teaching posts for the commerce stream so as to avoid running it with contractual teachers.
- The department of Political Science is found to be innovative to attract and retain good students for the major course. The other departments may also follow the modus operandi of the political science department.
- The college may arrange a motivational lecture for the entire fresher at the beginning of the session.
- The teachers may be encouraged to enhance their research output. To that end, the Principal may arrange a brainstorming session among the teachers to listen to their views and prepare a strategy for increasing research output of the teachers.
- The college caters to the educational needs of a large population of minority community of immigrant Muslim origin. As girls' education is by and large neglected among them, the college may chalk out a plan for spreading awareness among them on the need of girls' education.
- The college may ask the geography department to prepare a campus map to be displayed at the entrance of the college.
- Adequate ICT enabled class room facility may be made available to the academic department
- For effective delivery of curriculum, the course file of Academic departments should be assessed by IQAC

- A centre for local culture and tradition along with a museum may be set up based on the culture and tradition of greater Naduar area.
- More add-on vocational courses/ certificate course may be initiated.
- A language lab may be set up.
- Research culture needs much improvement and interdisciplinary research to be initiated.
- More departments and students should be involved in the extension activities.
- More teachers should be participating in the FIP/FDP Programmes.
- Proper documentation is required for all activities.
- Best practices of individual departments should be identified and need to be institutionalized.
- Students and society need to be engaged while formulating policies specific to students' welfare and society.
- Best practices of individual department for various aspects need to be institutionalized.
- More collaboration needs to be established for faculty exchange, students exchange, internship etc.
